

DILLN Case Study – Safeguarding Adults

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Part of the 50 steps to a healthier Newham involves '**increasing the number of services that better serve the population profile of Newham**'.

As part of the safeguarding service, the Safeguarding Adults Board (SAB) analyses data about safeguarding referrals and outcomes each year for their annual report.

The safeguarding data collected on adults during 2022/3 *did not reflect the diversity of the borough* and, in response to this, a quality improvement project was started to further understand the issue.







Defining the Problem

The Quality Improvement Program followed a specific process:

Define
$$\rightarrow$$
Discover \rightarrow Design \rightarrow Deliver \rightarrow Evaluate

The first step involved defining the problem: How did the data on referrals look, and how should they look?


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Data from DILLN

The Does It Look Like Newham (DILLN) tool gives users a snapshot of the ethnicities that are represented in the population.

DILLN shows ethnicity information broken down to the same granularity as the safeguarding information.

This allowed for a direct comparison of ethnicity data.



An example of DILLN data, looking at just Canning Town

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


Insight from DILLN

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The Safeguarding Adults' Board analysed the ethnicity of all safeguarding outcomes in the year 2022/2023, for people aged 20-29 and those aged 30-39. They then compared it to data exported from the DILLN tool, compare contact levels to Newham's population

Population



Rate of contacts with any outcome: any age since 1 Jan 2023

When accounting for population age structure, the contact rate is the **highest for White British** followed by Black Caribbean residents.

Lowest rates are seen amongst Indian, Bangladeshi, Pakistani and White & Asian residents.

For Black African residents, the underrepresentation was seen most 20-29 years old, suggesting there may be issues transitioning from children's to adults' services.

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DILLN in practice




The Safeguarding Adults' Board analysed the ethnicity of all safeguarding outcomes in the year 2022/2023.

Intuitively, this data seems skewed, but to be sure of this, they used DILLN to **compare service referrals to Newham's population**.

When accounting for what Newham looks like (orange), the contact rate (blue) is the highest for White British and Black Caribbean residents.

The lowest rates are seen amongst Indian, Bangladeshi, Pakistani and White & Asian residents.

Rate of contacts with any outcome: any age since 1 Jan 2023



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
Getting Insight from DILLN



The next step for the Safeguarding team was to find out what good work looked like, by writing a literature review of how other people handled similar issues of representation in safeguarding.

The initial insight from DILLN meant that the scoping questions could be much more pointed and be directly related to real inequalities in the data.

The next steps for this project are to take the literature review findings to focus groups, and having a more informed idea of the issue means this valuable time can be used more effectively.

The next stage of the problem, **discovery**, involved a literature review of how other people handled similar issues of representation in safeguarding, using the more specific questions about individual ethnicities.

DILLN helped by making it easier to ger data driven insights that helped to define a problem related to equity, and barriers service access.
